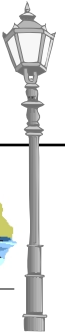

BOARD "OPTS OUT" ON GAMBLING EXPANSION

This past October the Commonwealth adopted legislation to allow for the expansion of gambling by permitting Category 4 gambling licensed facilities (known as "mini casinos") to operate a specific number of slot machines, video poker and table games throughout the state. State legislators representing our municipality strongly opposed the passage of this legislation as a means to meet funding gaps in the state budget.

The law allowed for municipalities to "opt out" of the law with the passage of a resolution prior to the December 31, 2017 deadline. Township Supervisors voted unanimously on November 13, 2017 to adopt Resolution 22-2017, to opt out and prohibit a Category 4 gambling licensed facility from operating within the township boundaries.

Legislative Update

The lengthy budget process appears to have finally come to an end as the Pennsylvania Legislature completed work on a variety of budget-related bills in late October. Though I am grateful that the process is completed, I have concerns with, and ultimately voted against, several controversial measures. This included the passage of a fiscal code that allowed for borrowing \$1.5 billion against Pennsylvania's annual payments from the Tobacco Master Settlement Agreement, as well as a new gaming expansion bill which would legalize a number of new forms of gambling, including online games, Video Gaming Terminals (VGTs) and up to 10 new satellite casinos. The reason why I voted no to these measures was because I feel that it is wrong to borrow money and expand the presence of inconsistent revenue sources that are bad for our communities in an attempt to once again bail out irresponsible and inefficient spending habits. With that said, in the aftermath of the gaming expansion legislation, I have extended an offer to help all of our municipalities to opt-out of having a satellite casino opened within their boundaries.

In other legislative news, the Senate passed Senate Bill 888, legislation I sponsored with Senator John C. Rafferty that focuses on protecting access to handicapped parking spaces. These spaces include access aisles--typically marked by blue diagonal stripes adjoining the parking space-- meant to allow disabled persons extra room to board and exit their vehicles. These access aisles provide crucial independence and access, yet current law does not provide adequate protection for these designated spaces. Sometimes disabled persons are made to wait hours with groceries in hand before being able to access their vehicle because someone decided to park their motorcycle, car, or truck inside the access aisle which may impede the operation of a wheelchair ramp.

No disabled person should be encumbered or hindered in enjoying everyday activities. Our legislation aims to address deficiencies in current law pertaining to penalties and enforcement of parking spaces for persons with disabilities. The legislation also creates parking regulations for access aisles in order to accommodate vehicles equipped with ramps, wheelchair lifts and other devices.

Another topic of focus in the legislature is the heroin and opioid epidemic. This crisis is ravaging communities across our state and affects people of all ages, genders, races, and ideologies. Our children are not only particularly vulnerable targets of these drugs, they are affected every day by the loss of loved family and dear friends who've lost their battles with these horrible drugs.

That is why the Pennsylvania Senate is partnering with the Drug and Alcohol Service Providers Association of PA in sponsoring the "Talk to Your Senator" video contest. The competition aims to involve teens in a positive and active role in the fight against this drug epidemic. We hope that by involving our 6th through 12th grade students, we may inspire novel ways of addressing alcohol and drug use among their peers and make students feel that they are not helpless or sidelined in this fight.

The competition provides prizes to be awarded through the TAP 529 Account program in the Pennsylvania Department of Treasury and will be deposited into a college savings account in the winner's name. Videos will be judged based on creativity, content and effectiveness of message delivery. More information can be found at www.acommonwealthcrisis.com.

Honoring Those Who Served

On October 21st, 2017 the Lancaster County legislative delegation was humbled by the opportunity to host a commemorative ceremony honoring veterans for their service during the Vietnam War era. During this ceremony, the delegation honored nearly 300 veterans. Each veteran was personally recognized and presented the Vietnam Veteran lapel pin as a lasting memento of our Nation's thanks. This memento pales in comparison to our gratefulness for their commitment to the United States of America.

The lapel pin signifies and represents the courage, honor, and dedication our men and women had in service to our nation. The canton of the American flag signifies vigilance, perseverance, and justice displayed by those who served. The six stars represent the six allies who served, sacrificed, and fought alongside another: Australia, New Zealand, the Philippines, the Republic of Korea, Thailand, and the United States. Embossed on the back, closest to the heart of the wearer are the words, "A Grateful Nation Thanks and Honors You."

In 2008, Congress passed the National Defense Authorization Act, which authorized the Secretary of Defense to conduct a program to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Vietnam War. This also directed the Secretary of Defense to coordinate, support and facilitate other programs commemorating veterans and their service in the Vietnam War, held by state and local governments, and other persons and community organizations.

The commemorative program served to honor and thank our veterans of the Vietnam War, including personnel who were held as prisoners of war (POW), listed as missing in action (MIA), and those who paid the ultimate sacrifice, having been killed in action (KIA). This ceremony highlighted the service of the Armed Forces during the Vietnam War and the contributions of federal agencies and government and non-governmental organizations that served with, or in support of, the Armed Forces. We also, recognized the commitment and contributions made on the home front by families, friends, and the people of the United States during the Vietnam War.

On behalf of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the Lancaster County legislative delegation thanks our men and women for their service and sacrifice, and extend our gratitude to the families and friends who are supportive of these veterans.

RIP Detective Jere “Bip” Schuler

As many of you know, we lost a friend, colleague and brother when Detective Jere Schuler passed away Saturday 30 September after a lengthy battle with cancer. Jere was hired by West Lampeter Township in 1986, was promoted to detective in 1992 and officially retired on Friday 29 September 2017. “October 2017

Recognition of Detective Jere J. Schuler 1986 – September 2017

Jere Schuler was hired as a West Lampeter Township Police Officer in 1986, and was appointed to the position of Detective in 1992.

Detective Schuler received the “Officer of the year” award in 2009 when he was recognized for his work over the years on many cases including murder convictions and a check scam that ended when Detective Schuler caught the perpetrator in a Willow Street Bank. Ultimately the individual was charged by the FBI with numerous federal charges.

Jere was a member of the Lancaster County major crime unit where he assisted with several high-profile Lancaster County cases including the Laurie Show, Christie Mirack and Troy Martin murder cases.

Detective Schuler did not use any sick days during his entire first 20 years of service to West Lampeter Township, and until he became very ill, would respond whenever called and work cases to the end.

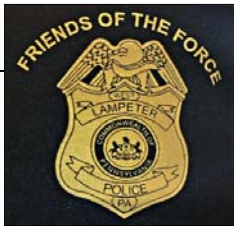
While on patrol, Jere was a very aggressive patrol officer, making DUI arrests and staying actively involved in traffic enforcement.

During his last 15 years on the force, Detective Schuler was on call 24/7 nearly every day of the year. He attended various investigator trainings, and was considered to be an expert interviewer.

When there was a need for special details or assignments, Detective Schuler was always there for the citizens of the Township, and for many years the Department came first in his life. He was always willing to help others and was committed to hold perpetrators accountable for their actions.

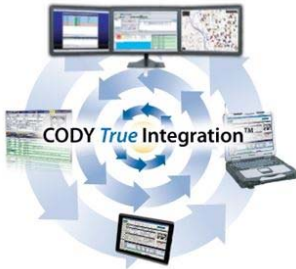
Detective Schuler was a recipient of the Lancaster County Human Relations Commission Award for his work in the community.

Jere was a valued member of the West Lampeter Township Police Department, and we commend him for 31 years of dedicated service to the residents of West Lampeter Township.”



FRIENDS OF THE WEST LAMPETER TOWNSHIP POLICE FORCE

The West Lampeter Township and the Friends of the Force are collaborating together on the purchase of the **CODY Records Management System** for the WLTPD. Approximately \$27,000 will be paid by the township and \$15,400 by the Friends of the Force.



This Records Management System will serve as the central nerve center of the WLTPD's future information management strategy. Every piece of information, from field contacts and incident reports, to cross referenced person records, scanned documents, multimedia files, and much more will be managed, accessible and searchable from one, common efficient user friendly source, available everywhere a user needs it. The system will provide decision support, investigative and statistical analysis for patrol and line level users Force.

The FOF will also be purchasing additional Combat Application Tourniquets (pictured) and PA Policeman's Short Guides. These short guides are easily carried by the officers in the field and provide a quick reference to PA crime codes, vehicle codes, PA Game Laws and much more.

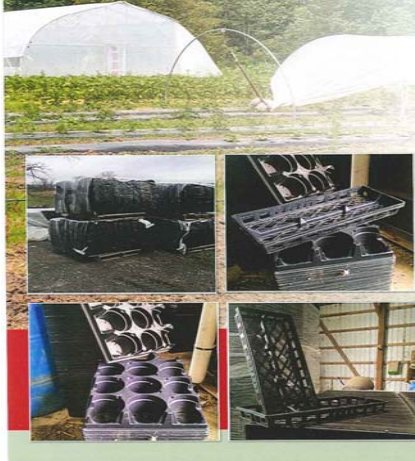

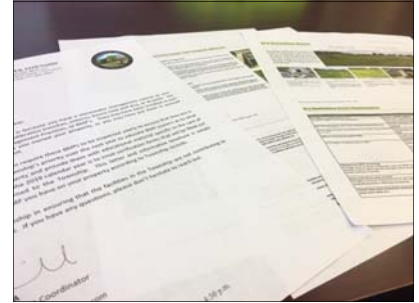

## STORMWATER CORNER

As we are wrapping up the construction season and the raindrops will begin to turn to snowflakes, West Lampeter Township has been busy as well! See below for an update on Stormwater related happenings in the Township.

**BMP Letters:** Did you receive a letter and information that looked like the picture to the right? There are approximately 250 Stormwater Best Management Practices or BMP's, installed in the Township to date (stormwater basins, underground infiltration trenches, rain gardens, etc.). Beginning in late 2018, the Township will be asking the owners of these BMP's to return a form/checklist verifying that the BMP that they own has been maintained properly. This initial mailing is informing you that you have a BMP on your property and includes maintenance information specific to the BMP that you have. The Township is responsible for making sure that BMP's are in good working order. If you have received a packet like this or if you receive one in the next month and you have questions please call the office at 717-464-8019 and ask for Charity. Thank you for your support in maintaining your stormwater system!



**Outfall Discharge Inspections:** In accordance with our State MS4 Permit, the Township is required to inspect the points in urbanized areas which water discharges from pipes and swales into streams. Typically the Township completes inspections in October and March of each calendar year. West Lampeter Township Public Works member, Sean Alexander assists with this effort biannually which includes inspecting and categorizing the outfalls, and testing any flow exiting these points for various pollutants with the kit shown to the left. 2017's inspections revealed that there are 68 discharge points to regulated waterways, 4 to the Conestoga River, 56 to the Mill Creek, and 8 to the Pequea Creek. Approximately 22% of the Township's outfalls have wet discharge, all of which are a result of underground springs as there were no elevated action levels of pollutants in the discharges found.



**Mill Bridge Campground Project:** As noted in the Fall newsletter, the Township received a \$199,610 grant through DEP and EPA for a collaborative streambank restoration effort with East Lampeter Township and Strasburg Borough, for a section of the Pequea Creek along the Mill Bridge Campground Property in East Lampeter Township along Bachmantown Rd, pictured to the right. East Lampeter Township engineer, DM/A is began survey work on this project this week and anticipates to kick off construction in the Spring of 2018.



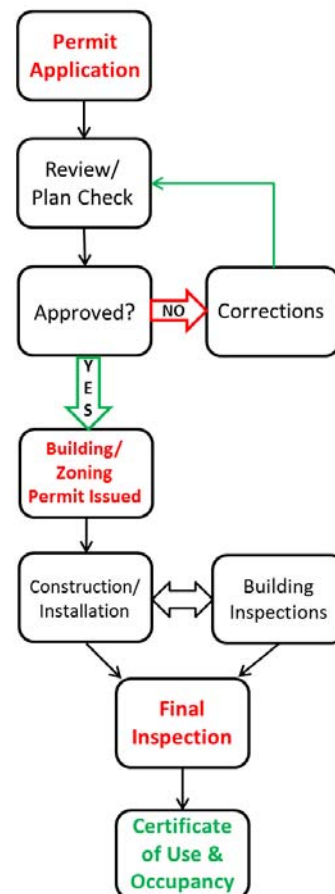

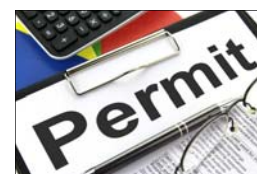
### **FINALIZING A BUILDING/ZONING PROJECT**

Township staff is assisting property owners with finalizing their building/zoning projects, as permits issued expire after one year. Please note that a Certificate of Use and Occupancy is required upon completion of ALL projects requiring a permit. This includes not only construction, but the installation of sheds, fences, swimming pools, and driveway and patio expansions. A certificate of use indicates, to the best knowledge of the Zoning Officer and Building Code Official that the project complies with the provisions of all current Township Ordinances and Pennsylvania Construction Code. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, as well as the International Building Code requires that this certificate be obtained PRIOR to using the project. Please remember to final out all projects within the one year time period by calling the Township office to schedule a final inspection or apply for an extension. ### **UCC BUILDING PERMIT FEE INCREASED**

(from PSATS News Bulletin, November 2017)



The Pennsylvania Construction Code Act was amended to make comprehensive changes to the Uniform Construction Code (UCC) Review and Advisory Council, and the process used by the council to evaluate and adopt the new versions of the International Code Council manuals. The act increased the building permit fee (also known as State Mandated Education Fee) from \$4.00 to \$4.50. The amendment took effect on October 25, 2017.

The Board of Supervisors adopted a resolution on November 13, 2017 to make this change to the fee schedule, and subsequently the fee of \$4.50 will be assessed on all building permits issued by the township.
