## NEW VETERANS MEDICAL CLINIC IN WILLOW STREET

The newest Veterans Community Clinic opened in late 2018 at the Willow Valley Lakes Medical Center. The Lancaster County VA Clinic moved from 1861 Charter Lane to its new location in Willow Street.



The new clinic is 15,000 square feet. It has sixteen exam rooms, one specific exam room for women, seven behavioral health treatment rooms, a group therapy room, two optometry rooms, and a physical therapy center. It offers primary care, women's health care, mental health care, preventative care, laboratory and point of care testing services, rehabilitation services and optometry services for veterans.

The clinic is located at 212 Willow Valley Lakes Drive, Suite 208, Willow Street. The U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs website advises new patients to call 1-800-409-8771, extension 6000, for information on scheduling appointments at this clinic.

## **HARRISBURG HAPPENINGS**

### **New Session Offers Opportunities for Progress on Old and New Ideas**

The first few months of a new legislative session offers lawmakers an opportunity to bring new ideas to the table, and also to renew efforts to pass measures that didn't reach the governor's desk in the previous two years. As we begin the 2019-2020 Legislative Session, I am already working on a number of ideas – both old and new – that are of interest to local communities.

One new idea would give community residents a stronger say about the expansion of gambling in Lancaster County. When lawmakers approved new gambling options in Pennsylvania last year, including a provision to create new mini-casinos, every municipality was offered the option to prohibit a new gambling venue from being constructed in their community. Every single community in Lancaster County opted-out.

Unfortunately, there was no opt-out provision for the location of video gaming terminals (VGTs) in truck stops. Earlier this year, I partnered with Senator Ryan Aument to introduce legislation that would allow municipalities to prohibit the placement of VGT gambling devices at any venue in the community.

In addition to working on this new problem, I have already begun work on a number of issues from the previous session, including legislation to change the way we fund our schools. I have again signed on as a co-sponsor to legislation that would reform property taxes statewide. I am hopeful that we can move this conversation forward and reform this tax once and for all.

I also continue to focus on ways to protect volunteer fire companies. I recently re-introduced two bills designed to protect the people who put their lives on the line to protect our property and our well-being.

One of the bills would ensure members of volunteer fire companies are eligible to receive workers compensation coverage for injuries that take place in the performance of their duties. The State Workers Insurance Fund is now denying coverage to these critical volunteers who are protecting our lives, so it is critical to reexamine this issue and ensure these brave men and women are not left to fend for themselves if they are hurt in the line of duty.

I am also renewing the fight to exempt volunteer firefighters from paying sales tax on food and beverages sold for fundraising efforts. The bill would ensure that more of the money they raise can be used to purchase equipment and undergo training instead of those dollars being sent to Harrisburg.

Finally, I am continuing to work on behalf of a small part of the population who desperately need our support – kids who are fighting cancer. Last year, I authored a new law that allows individuals to support cancer research facilities by making voluntary donations when they complete driver's license applications. This year, I reintroduced a resolution bringing more awareness to their struggle, as well as a bill that would create a new tax credit program that would generate up to \$100 million for childhood cancer research over the next 10 years. I am hopeful these measures will send a message that families facing a childhood cancer diagnosis do not need to face this fight alone.

## **HARRISBURG HAPPENINGS**

### **Greiner Named to Key Financial Committees**

House leaders have once again named me to serve on four key House committees, three of which provide me a very active role in addressing many of the Commonwealth's most pressing financial issues.

As one of the few certified public accountants in the House and as a fiscal watchdog, I am grateful to once again be named to the powerful House Appropriations Committee. The General Assembly's primary responsibility is to pass the annual state budget and the Appropriations Committee is at the epicenter of that process. In addition, I was honored to be named Chairman of the Subcommittee on Fiscal Policy by Appropriations Chairman Stan Saylor (R-York). With both Governor Wolf and the legislature focusing on tax reform in the Commonwealth, this is a very critical committee, and I look forward in being a key member participating in these discussions.

I also look forward to attending several weeks of budget hearings which will begin in our Appropriations Committee this month. These hearings provide us an opportunity to scrutinize state spending and determine how best to protect the interests of Pennsylvania taxpayers as we work toward passing a responsible budget by June 30.

I have also been very fortunate to be reappointed to the Finance, Commerce and Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness committees, all of which should benefit from my background and experience.

The Finance Committee handles tax-related legislation, including any proposed property tax reform legislation, which there are already discussions. In addition, I was humbled to be named as the Secretary of this very important committee by House Finance Chairman Michael Peifer (R- Pike, Wayne). My experience working for a certified public accounting firm for nearly 25 years has helped to provide me a comprehensive background in dealing with the numerous complex individual and corporate tax issues in the Commonwealth.

Commerce is the oversight committee for state or federally regulated businesses or institutions that do business in the Commonwealth, such as banks, credit unions, securities and investment companies. It addresses unfair trade practices, consumer protections, state procurement programs, as well as state economic development and technical assistance programs.

My background as a volunteer firefighter with the Upper Leacock Fire Company for over 25 years has given me a deep appreciation for the challenges facing emergency responders. My reappointment to the Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee will enable me to continue to be a voice for emergency responders and our military personnel who put their lives on the line to protect ours.

I am honored to serve on these committees, and I am continually thankful for the opportunity to serve the residents of the 43<sup>rd</sup> District.

## WEST LAMPETER TOWNSHIP POLICE FORCE

The West Lampeter Township Police Department (WLTPD) has been going through a tremendous amount of change already this year. This is above and beyond what comes in to the department on a daily basis.

To start, Officer David Covey began his duties as the new School Resource Officer at the Lampeter Strasburg High School. His presence there has already been felt, as he has been able to assist with investigations, suggest enhanced security procedures, engage in guest speaking activities and assist in the implementation of the 'Safe2Say' tip line. Future plans include a mock crash presentation, along with the utilization of newly obtained equipment for combating intoxicated drivers.

Additionally, Officer Philip Strosser started his employment with WLTPD after retiring from the PA State Police. His presence on the street has already been remarkable. He comes to us with a vast knowledge of the vehicle code and he has already excelled in locating intoxicated drivers and drug violations. In fact, within the first four hours after his release from field training, he made a felony drug arrest.

WLTPD Officers worked with the staff of the Willow Street Career and Technology Center to discuss implementation of the 'Safe2Say' tip line. They also discussed campus security measures with staff to further enhance the safety of our students.

Officers from the department have received training in various disciplines, to include: Supervisor Training for Line-of-Duty Shooting Investigations, Active Shooter Response and Investigation Training, Prescription Drug Abuse classes, Breath Test Operations classes and Street Survival Officer Safety Training. Officer Evan Shubrooks is about to take over as the Department's CPR/AED trainer. Officers also attended various traffic safety seminars. They also worked in-house to train and put into service the department's new 9 mm duty weapons.

The department was awarded a letter of appreciation from the Aggressive Driving Enforcement and Education Program for continued participation in targeted traffic enforcement details. Our officers conducted details to target speed related offenses, distracted drivers, seatbelt violators, school bus passing and various other traffic related offenses.

While all of this occurs, the officers are still in the midst of a vast array of daily investigations and continue to provide various services to the residents and visitors of our township. In the first two months of the year, we handled approximately 57 traffic crashes, issued 174 citations, checked 53 alarms, handled 91 traffic related complaints, arrested 25 individuals for criminal violations and conducted numerous targeted traffic details. We answered at least 221 calls for service as well. This did not stop us from pausing to take part in the Martin Meylin Middle School Dodge ball tournament, which, sadly, we lost again.

### Road Repair



## FRIENDS OF THE FORCE

### "Grab and Go Ready Bag"

The Friends of the Force (FOF) has equipped the West Lampeter Township Police Department's newest patrol car with a "grab and go ready bag." Equipment in the ready bag includes:



- An Automated External Defibrillator (AED)  
This portable electronic device automatically diagnoses life-threatening cardiac arrhythmias and is able to treat them through defibrillation that will stop the condition and reestablishes an effective heart rhythm.
- Portable Breath Testers  
These testers provide reliable and accurate handheld breath testing of individuals in suspected DUI stops. They allow the officer maximum control over the subject during sample collection.
- CPR Protective Masks  
Used to safely deliver rescue breaths during cardiac or respiratory emergencies. Protects the rescuer from bodily fluids such as vomit.
- Combat Action Tourniquets  
These one-handed tourniquets are standard issue in our armed forces and proven to be 100% effective. When every second counts, they provide for fast and effective application to prevent loss of blood in an extremity.

The FOF has also purchased additional equipment requested by the department for their Nikon D5000 digital crime scene scan camera. This includes a Macro lens, various lens filters and a tripod. These items will enhance the picture taking capabilities at crime and accident scenes.

## TRASH & RECYCLING



### Please do NOT Recycle...

Knowing what to recycle is only half of the battle. Knowing what cannot be recycled is just as important. It is usually not very difficult to convince people of the value of recycling. Robust participation in recycling is not only good for the environment, it also enables the township to control its costs and keep our trash and recycling fees down. The real challenge lies in helping people to learn what items cannot be recycled. According to Lancaster County Solid Waste Management Authority (LCSWMA), about 20 to 40 percent of the material placed in curbside recycling containers should be placed in the trash instead. When in doubt, throw it out! **Please do not put any of the following in your recycling containers:**

**PAPER-** Newspapers, office paper, magazines, and catalogues.

\*You can drop off any of these paper items at our Community Recycling Event on April 27 from 9 a.m. to noon, located behind the Township municipal building at 852 Village Road. Also, you can place your glossy magazines and catalogues in the Ronald McDonald drop-off bin located behind the Township municipal building at 852 Village Road. The drop-off bin is available 24 hours a day.

**ELECTRONICS-** Computers, modems, mice, keyboards, monitors, cell phones, hard drives, battery backups, and DVD players.

\*You can drop off your unwanted electronics at our Community Recycling Event on April 27 from 9 a.m. to noon, located behind the Township municipal building at 852 Village Road.

**PACKAGING-** Bubble wrap, polystyrene, Styrofoam, packing peanuts, and plastic packing pillows.

\*Styrofoam and Polystyrene can be recycled at the drop-off bin located outside the Dart facility on Pitney Road across from HACC.

**CLOTHES AND LINENS-** Clothes, linens, blankets, and towels.

\*You can donate usable clothes, linens, and blankets to a local charity. Veterinary clinics are often in need of usable blankets and towels (e.g., Willow Run Veterinary Clinic at 320 Beaver Valley Pike).

**MEDICAL WASTE-** Any medical waste, including syringes and other items used for medical treatment.

\*Penn Waste reports that over 500 pounds of medical waste were received at their recycling facility in 2016. Medical waste needs to be properly disposed of in the trash. Penn Waste recommends placing any needles in a heavy plastic container (laundry detergent bottle, coffee container, etc.). This will ensure that the needle will not injure a Penn Waste employee during collection.

**PLASTIC BAGS-** Plastic grocery and shopping bags.

\*Plastic bags can be recycled at the drop-off containers inside your local grocery store, at Lowe's, and at Home Depot.

**UNACCEPTABLE ITEMS LIST**

**WOODY MATERIAL** - Picked up Free of Charge if bundled with biodegradable twine or rope in lengths no longer than 4', diameter no wider than 4", no heavier than 30lbs. Up to 10 bundles may be placed at the curb on any collection day.

**HOLIDAY SCHEDULE** - Mondays: May 27 (Memorial Day) and Labor Day (September 2). Collection will take place **ONE DAY LATER** - Monday to Tuesday; Tuesday to Wednesday.

## STORMWATER CORNER

### **Sanitary Sewer Overflows:**

#### **What Causes Them, How to Spot Them and How to Report Them**

West Lampeter Township's MS4 program is very proactive in spotting Illicit Discharges to creeks, streams, and inlets. Events that the stormwater department is trying to prevent are things like oil & fuel spills, polluted construction runoff, and localized inlet pollution. Most folks would be surprised to know that a fair amount of illicit discharges to our waterways and stormwater systems are the result of sanitary sewer overflows. Let's discuss how they happen, and what you can do to prevent them from becoming a bigger problem.

#### **What Causes Sanitary Sewer Overflows**

A number of factors can cause the sanitary system to overflow:

- Blockages
- Breaks in the line
- Defects allowing the system to overload
- Improper design
- Power failures

The most common causes of those listed are blockages and power failures. Blockages are exactly as they sound. The piping can become clogged with solids and will back-up at the nearest pipe junction. Power failures become an issue in areas where the sewer is being pumped through the system. Pump Stations (see figure 1), grinder pumps, and emergency generators for those systems all need power to continue to move sewage.

#### **What Overflows Look Like**

Sanitary sewer overflows are usually liquid overflows from manholes in the street. When you think sanitary sewer overflow, it's natural to assume that there will be a greater indication that the fluid spilling is sewage and not stormwater. Here are some indicators:

- Fluid leaking from a round manhole
- Fluid has a marked odor to it
- Liquid discharging from a pump station or the mechanicals nearby
- Liquid contains solids or debris
- You see fluid leaking and it has not rained for 48-72 hours

#### **Who To Contact**

In West Lampeter Township, we do not have our own sewer authority. Our public sewer is supplied by the Suburban Lancaster Sewer Authority (SLASA). SLASA emergencies can be reported to the City of Lancaster Bureau of Wastewater Operations via this 24 hour phone number, (717) 293-5533.

Most spills are only a few gallons at a time, but if they are not reported that can turn into hundreds of gallons over the course of days or weeks. This is why it is helpful for residents to know what is a spill so that we can report spills faster before they drain to storm systems and waterways and have greater impacts.

## **COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT**

### **Construction Dumpsters & Building Materials Storage**



A permit is required to store dumpsters and/or building materials on any street or sidewalk in the township. The placement of any dumpster/materials may not be closer than 15 feet of a fire hydrant and must comply with all motor vehicle and traffic codes. Dumpsters must have reflectorized or lighted barricades and may not exceed 8 feet in width or 20 feet in length. Dumpsters may not impede the clear sight of oncoming vehicles and must contain visible signage with the supplier's contact information, including a phone number. All dumpsters and building supplies shall be neatly maintained and removed as soon as possible [§235-35 Building materials and dumpsters].

To obtain a permit, submit page 1 of our building/zoning permit application, with the specific location and dates of the proposed storage. If the location is deemed safe, the permit will be issued at a current cost of \$20 and it valid for 30 days.

### **Trash & Recycling Containers**

Please be aware trash and recycling containers must be removed from the streets within 12 hours after the scheduled day of collection. Leaving empty carts out along the streets can become a danger to drivers and a nuisance for neighbors. Help keep our township safe and attractive by removing your containers in a timely manner [§224-18].

### **Maintaining your Property**

West Lampeter Township has a Property Maintenance Code which requires that all residents maintain the exterior of their properties free from high grass and noxious weeds in excess of 10 inches. [§302.4] Weeds are considered as all grasses, annual plants (except cultivated flowers and gardens), and vegetation. Please also refrain from blowing or sweeping grass clippings into the road since it can clog storm drain systems.

In addition, the exterior of the lot should also be free of junk, trash and non-operative or unlicensed motor vehicles. No motor vehicle shall be in a state of major disassembly, disrepair, or in the process of being stripped or dismantled. Violations of the property maintenance code are subject to fines and penalties.
